ELECTIONS QUESTIONNAIRE

1. Throughout high school, I was very involved in a multitude of school activities – from cross-country, to choir, to Academic Decathlon. My passion for these groups manifested into taking on leadership positions, hoping to inspire and encourage my peers. When I entered college, I naturally gravitated toward groups that would feed my curious mind beyond course work. The American Institute of Architecture Students stood out above the rest, with dedicated architecture students promoting positive studio culture, building strong networks with faculty and professionals, and always hosting events that aided in our professional development.

I fell in love with the organization my freshman year. However, I must admit, it was not a dream of mine to lead our school's chapter. I looked up to the chapter's leaders with admiration and awe, wondering how they managed to do so well in school and leading the AIAS Arizona chapter. "How do they do it all?" I remember asking myself. I was certainly inspired by their hard work, yet certainly intimated as well. Although I had held leadership positions throughout high school, being an architecture student was a completely different game. Luckily, the amazing past leadership of our chapter instilled a drive within me to step up to plate.

I went from being a member on the Social Committee to being the Chapter President. While a lot of personal and professional growth happened in between, one thing remained a constant – my passion to help others. When stressful deadlines and AIAS events coincided, I used this passion to carry on. I still do. AIAS is about the students; it is about giving every opportunity for architecture students to succeed. Without positive studio culture, our entire experience could be negative and detrimental to our potential.

When my school's studios were experiencing aspects of negative studio culture, our AIAS chapter organized forums to create open communication between the students and faculty. These simple efforts went a long way in transforming our studio culture. While many agree that we need positive studio culture, there is still work to be done to curate these environments.

As an elected leader of the AIAS National Board of Directors, I will work fervently to advocate for change. First, there has to be an understanding of studio culture nationally, so surveys and similar methods would be conducted. Then, it is all about communication and advocacy. As a national organization, we have a strong system of support to create change within environments that desperately need it. Students who have experienced any aspect of negative studio culture should know that AIAS is here to help. We can create positive change through open communication with schools and their leaders. We can use the support of our associated organizations to make progress. However, it is all about communication and collaboration, and an elected leader, I can help unite and challenge these efforts to make a difference.

3. With so many members and students across the world, it is all about reaching out to connect our diverse membership. While social media is an engaging and accessible platform, conducting virtual meetings with chapter leadership is equally as important. Our membership needs to know that the Board of Directors is available as support and a resource for their chapters. In addition to using our knowledge as a resource, chapter leaders who are seeking to grow to connect their own membership can build off of others' successes.

As West Quadrant Director, an important role for me is to unite and engage chapters across the region to learn and grow from one another. Chapters who are struggling with membership should know they are not alone. In addition, they should use fellow chapters as resources, learning from those who have success and helping those who need it – leaders helping leaders. AIAS is a collaborate effort. AMERICAN INSTITUTE OF ARCHITECTURE STUDENTS POLICY ON COMPENSATION FOR INTERNS

In July 1993, the AIAS Board of Directors adopted a "Public Policy on Uncompensated Interns." The policy has been subsequently reviewed and reaffirmed by the Board and reads as follows:

The AIAS maintains that employers must properly compensate all employees. Compensation must be in compliance with the regulations for the jurisdiction in which they are working.

In 2010, AIAS crafted a public statement on intern compensation in conjunction with the Association of Collegiate Schools of Architecture and the American Institute of Architects, which reads as follows:

The Association of Collegiate Schools of Architecture, the American Institute of Architects, and the American Institute of Architecture Students recognize that architects are bound by law and ethics to pay interns, and strongly advocate for the appropriate compensation of architectural students and interns. Because of current economic transformations, some architects have both solicited and accepted the services and labor of interns without pay. We strongly urge architectural firms and other for-profit employers to respect the law and comply with the ethical standards of our profession, and we strongly encourage interns to refuse to accept employment without pay, and to notify the Department of Labor in cases where employers propose such an arrangement. For more information on labor laws and professional ethics, please see the AIA Code of Ethics and the U.S. Labor Department standards under the Fair Labor Standards Act.

The ACSA, AIA, and AIAS further support architects, students, and recent graduate doing pro-bono work. We recognize the distinction between unpaid work for profit-making employers, and unpaid work for non-profit organizations, communities in need, and volunteer activities, which allows participants to determine their own hours and degree of involvement. The AIA has established guidelines for service that are provided on a Pro Bono basis. They can be found under the member section of the AIA website.

POLICY ON COMPENSATION FOR INTERNS AFFIRMATION

As a way of confirming that the AIAS is not promoting or being promoted by architects employing unpaid interns, we ask that each participant in an official AIAS function review and sign the following statement. We appreciate your participation in our event and thank you for your support of our position against unpaid internships. This position is supported as well by the Board of Directors of the Association of Collegiate Schools of Architecture (ACSA) and the American Institute of Architects (AIA).

AMERICAN INSTITUTE OF ARCHITECTURE STUDENTS ELECTIONS CODE OF ETHICS

Elections are a critical step by which the American Institute of Architecture Students is governed. Annual elections, as outlined in the Bylaws and the Rules of the Board, ensure that the membership of the organization participates in the selection of the best candidates to serve on the national Board of Directors.

Individuals elected to the Board of Directors represent the membership and ensure the continued success of the organization. Therefore, participants who are involved in the elections process, including candidates, Board members and elections committee members, are expected to demonstrate the highest standards of professionalism, integrity, and good judgment.

Confidentiality is required of all participants in the elections process. Participants should not discuss details of the elections process to the general membership before, during or after FORUM. Elections information that is considered public knowledge, and therefore can be shared with the membership, occurs during the General Business Sessions and at the General Assemblies.

Campaigning is strictly prohibited prior to FORUM. Conversation between chapters regarding candidates should not take place. Campaigning will only begin at the first General Assembly of FORUM.

Campaigning during FORUM shall be professional. Candidates and candidate support groups should be respectful in their campaigning efforts. Disrespectful campaigning will be a violation of the Elections Code of Ethics, and will be grounds for immediate review by the Elections Committee.

Campaigning materials should follow the Election Guidelines, and should be distributed in appropriate venues only. Appropriate venues include FORUM General Business Sessions, General Assemblies, and Quad Breakouts.

As leaders of this organization, and future leaders of this profession, we must uphold the highest ethical practice. Questionable behavior during elections will not be tolerated. Any concerns should be immediately raised with the Elections Chair.
