QUESTIONNAIRE

1. We all love the AIAS for different reasons, but it takes a critical and constructive analysis of the institutions we appreciate most to continue to evolve them into entities that can support each new generation of membership. Why are you running for a position on the AIAS Board of Directors? What about the organization and its membership motivates you to seek a leadership position?

You can only make so many connections in one place. My love for the AIAS and the reason for running comes through the personal connections made within conferences, Hub hangouts, and other events. When I first entered school I felt like I was trying to capture what it was like to be in college and wanted to get the lay of the land and didn't want to jump right into things. Then having a pause on friendships and connections with Covid I knew I needed more than my single university could provide. I branched out and found a community through AIAS, my experiences have been transformational.

My connections and experiences led me to help organize the Northeast Quad 2023 conference. I am motivated to continue with these connections and therefore seek the position of Northeast Quad Director. The planning of the conference gave me a glimpse of what happened outside of the local level of my school and the local chapter of AIAS. It was these powerful connections to a national community of architecture that have opened doors to a new connected vision for my design. This new vision and wealth of possibilities is exciting and one I want to embrace by seeking a position on the Board of Directors.

2. Though it may be hard to believe, the AIAS is not perfect. A critical analysis of any organization is a healthy part of its operation. There may be things that you feel the AIAS could do better, or maybe you see new opportunities or partners to engage. Where do you see room for improvement or new areas for the organization to expand into?

Throughout my time with AIAS, I have seen the need for connections and interaction with other students between our conferences and hub hangouts. How do we move forward in a world where people aren't looking at their emails as much and maybe not responding to messages like in Slack or other applications? This in-between space is similar to how universities facilitate student engagement activities. Covid opened the door to different ways to connect and interact with students and colleagues. We can use this to our advantage. I do feel that this comes from an aspect of the hub hangouts being important, but focusing only on the health of the club and not giving students the image that this is also an event that others can come to, not only the officers of their local chapter go. "I'm not supposed to do that" or "I don't go to that" mentality is prevalent around Hub hangouts. We need to break through this attitude, and as a quad Director, or a leader, we stand in a position where we can help bring students together; by facilitating the interactions that have been obstacles in the past and creating modes for change and development. Working together to create new activities, connections between local chapters, and even trying to create connections across the different quads would allow each member to find a special connection to AIAS.

QUESTIONNAIRE

3. In recent years, the AIAS has increased its efforts in advocacy for architecture students on issues including but not limited to health and wellness, equity, student loan debt, Learning and teaching Culture, practice experience, leadership, and technology. What one issue do you personally find the most important? How would you make progress on this issue as an elected leader on the AIAS National Board of Directors?

AIAS does many great things for students. It is easy to be grateful for all AIAS offers to architects in training. However, change will happen and there are ways that we can help serve students in different ways. One area that I would like to see a great emphasis on is practice experience. Internships and other practical experiences are key for moving forward from school into a firm. I envision a national-level initiative, helping chapters create plans with local firms as well as the school to make connections with potential job experiences. The agenda would be to teach how practical experience helps accelerate student learning. An architecture degree can be used in many ways. For example, Jake Day, the keynote speaker for 2023 Grassroots, has an undergraduate degree in architecture. He has used the degree when being Mayor of his hometown, Salisbury, MD, and current Maryland Secretary of Housing. We can help students see how they might graduate with a degree in architecture and how this could help them move forward in different ways. Finally, we can support students to see how different degrees can match up and what jobs are available today for people with a degree in architecture.

4. The AIAS has over 250 chapters across the U.S. and worldwide, ranging in size, age range, and even purpose. How would you use your position on the Board to better connect and engage our geographically and culturally diverse membership? What resources would you propose to serve better Chapter leaders seeking to grow their chapters and connect to other students around the world?

Communication between people is one of the hardest tasks, in the world today we have people communicating in different ways geographically and culturally. Let's look at how our communication between different ethnicities helps build us as people and how in the activities and events we plan. We are thinking of how we are going to work in a way that allows for all people to enjoy and have the same experience; People might not respond or have a hard time getting peers to attend chapter meetings. It is a key component and one has to consistently work at ways to reach others. How do we realize as an overall organization and at the clubs and chapter's levels how to hook students and get them excited for activities? What would be the resources that help out current chapter leaders? Let's take a step back and see what was done in the past. I feel that we could have an archive resource that gives leaders a look at what has worked and not worked in the past to help move us forward. There are a lot of new leaders starting and veteran leaders within our organization, how do we transfer the info from one another to help all of us be successful. I think one of the biggest takeaways for a leader of the Marywood University chapter is learning what grabs the student's attention. We created transparency with everyone on how and why to join AIAS. Many students think that they're just paying a fee and not getting some benefits from it. Recently we organized a tower building competition for the entire school of architecture, approximately 500 students.

We helped engage other classmates with the club, interacting with other students and pushing for a better studio culture, and partnered up with other organizations, (TSD and OMAS). It is to AIAS's advantage when you notice students being in the building and communicating with professors.

5. Describe how you intend to fulfill the roles and responsibilities of your chosen position on the Board. Elaborate on your intended communication/action plan and your primary goals for your one-year term.

When I envision the position of Quad Director, the number one priority is communication with chapters. This seems like a common answer, but I am unique in my approach, as I see this as a need to connect with a new generation of architecture. We need to approach the situation with clear goals, test our attempts, and change quickly when they are not effective.

My focus as Quad Director would be assisting chapters in connecting across chapters. By working with peers who are looking for new ways of reaching out already, but don't have a set path. I would start on a small scale to figure out ways to get practice experience to be helped throughout the quad facilitated through meetings and trying to assist in the creation of school-based plans. Helping with the planning of meetings that give the chapters as much help as needed. Seeing how to work with professors and faculty to create school-wide architecture activities to gain traction and interest in what we do as an organization.

Finally, as the Northeast Quad Director, I hope to create a year filled with fun and connection. My focus will be on kickstarting new events and group hangouts that can become traditions for years to come. I look forward to this new chapter and all of the possibilities I can contribute to the AIAS.

AMERICAN INSTITUTE OF ARCHITECTURE STUDENTS POLICY ON COMPENSATION FOR INTERNS

In July 1993, the AIAS Board of Directors adopted a "Public Policy on Uncompensated Interns." The policy has been subsequently reviewed and reaffirmed by the Board and reads as follows:

The AIAS maintains that employers must properly compensate all employees. Compensation must be in compliance with the regulations for the jurisdiction in which they are working.

In 2010, AIAS crafted a public statement on intern compensation in conjunction with the Association of Collegiate Schools of Architecture and the American Institute of Architects, which reads as follows:

The Association of Collegiate Schools of Architecture, the American Institute of Architects, and the American Institute of Architecture Students recognize that architects are bound by law and ethics to pay interns, and strongly advocate for the appropriate compensation of architectural students and interns. Because of current economic transformations, some architects have both solicited and accepted the services and labor of interns without pay. We strongly urge architectural firms and other for-profit employers to respect the law and comply with the ethical standards of our profession, and we strongly encourage interns to refuse to accept employment without pay, and to notify the Department of Labor in cases where employers propose such an arrangement. For more information on labor laws and professional ethics, please see the AIA Code of Ethics and the U.S. Labor Department standards under the Fair Labor Standards Act.

The ACSA, AIA, and AIAS further support architects, students, and recent graduate doing pro-bono work. We recognize the distinction between unpaid work for profit-making employers, and unpaid work for non-profit organizations, communities in need, and volunteer activities, which allows participants to determine their own hours and degree of involvement. The AIA has established guidelines for service that are provided on a Pro Bono basis. They can be found under the member section of the AIA website.

POLICY ON COMPENSATION FOR INTERNS AFFIRMATION

As a way of confirming that the AIAS is not promoting or being promoted by architects employing unpaid interns, we ask that each participant in an official AIAS function review and sign the following statement. We appreciate your participation in our event and thank you for your support of our position against unpaid internships. This position is supported as well by the Board of Directors of the Association of Collegiate Schools of Architecture (ACSA) and the American Institute of Architects (AIA).

AMERICAN INSTITUTE OF ARCHITECTURE STUDENTS ELECTIONS CODE OF ETHICS

Elections are a critical step by which the American Institute of Architecture Students is governed. Annual elections, as outlined in the Bylaws and the Rules of the Board, ensure that the membership of the organization participates in the selection of the best candidates to serve on the national Board of Directors.

Individuals elected to the Board of Directors represent the membership and ensure the continued success of the organization. Therefore, participants who are involved in the elections process, including candidates and Board Members, are expected to demonstrate the highest standards of professionalism, integrity, and good judgment.

Confidentiality is required of all participants in the elections process. Participants should not discuss details of the elections process to the general membership before, during or after FORUM. Elections information that is considered public knowledge, and therefore can be shared with the membership, occurs during the General Business Sessions and at the General Assemblies.

Campaigning is strictly prohibited prior to FORUM. Conversation between chapters regarding candidates should not take place. Campaigning will only begin at the first General Assembly of FORUM.

Campaigning during FORUM shall be professional. Candidates and candidate support groups should be respectful in their campaigning efforts. Disrespectful campaigning will be a violation of the Elections Code of Ethics, and will be grounds for immediate review by the Past President.

Campaigning materials should follow the Election Guidelines, and should be distributed in appropriate venues only. Appropriate venues include FORUM General Business Sessions, General Assemblies, and Quad Breakouts.

As leaders of this organization, and future leaders of this profession, we must uphold the highest ethical practice. Questionable behavior during elections will not be tolerated. Any concerns should be immediately raised with the Past President.
